Lillian Fritzler has now gone through all the research policies and the records of your prior leave, and we have determined that your next eligibility for a *mid-sabbatical leave* will be Fall 1998 and your next eligibility for a *sabbatical leave* will be Fall 2001. We have assumed in determining this that you will be in residence and teaching all terms between now and the terms listed above; if you are on leave for some other reason during one of the intervening terms, your leave eligibility may be later.
